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SPEAKERS

Keynotes:

Donald S. Coffey, Ph.D, is a Professor of Urology, Oncology, and Pharmacology and Molecular Sciences at The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. He is Director of the research laboratories of the Department of Urology. A prominent urological scientist, Dr. Coffey was appointed as the Catherine lola and J. Smith Michael Distinguished Professor of Urology at The Johns Hopkins School of Medicine. Dr. Coffey is also a member of the Principal Professional Staff at The Johns Hopkins University Applied Physics Laboratory. He received his Ph.D. in Biochemistry from The Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in 1964.

Philip W. Kantoff, MD, is the Chief of the Division of Solid Tumor Oncology, the Chief Clinical Research Officer and the Director of the Lank Center for Genitourinary Oncology at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute. He graduated from Brown University Medical School in 1979. After completing his internship and residency in internal medicine at New York University Hospital and Bellevue Hospital, he spent four years at the National Institutes of Health conducting research in gene therapy. He joined DFCI in 1987. He is the leader of the Dana-Farber/Harvard Cancer Center Prostate Cancer Program, and Director of the prostate cancer Specialized Program of Research Excellence (SPORE).

Presenters:

H. Joseph Barthold, MD, holds appointments at Commonwealth Atrius Cancer Center, Jordan Hospital and Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center. He received the American Cancer Society's Leadership in Prostate Cancer Award in 2000. Dr. Barthold is also an instructor in radiation oncology at Harvard Medical School.

Cheryl Bartlett, MDPH, is the director of the Division of Health Promotion and Disease Prevention for the Massachusetts Department of Public Health which includes four public health hospitals, the State Laboratory, several regulatory bodies, and numerous programmatic units.

Glenn J. Bublely, MD, has been the Director of a multidisciplinary genitourinary cancer program dealing primarily with prostate biology at the Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center since 1988. In 2009, MPCC honored him with the Jack Colbert Award.

J. Jacques Carter, MD, MPH, is on the staff of Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center and assistant professor of medicine, Harvard Medical School.

Marc Garnick, MD, is an internationally renowned expert in medical oncology and urologic cancer. A clinical professor of medicine at Harvard Medical School, he also maintains an active clinical practice at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center. Dr. Garnick is the Editor in Chief of HarvardProstateKnowledge.org and *Harvard Medical School's Annual Report on Prostate Diseases*, both of which emerged from his keen interest in explaining issues of medical importance to patients and their families to help them make appropriate treatment choices.

Julia H. Hayes, MD, holds an appointment as attending physician at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute and Brigham and Women's Hospital, where her clinical interest is genitourinary malignancies. Her research interest is decision analysis, and her work in outcomes research to date has focused specifically on the risks and benefits of prostate-specific antigen screening for prostate cancer.

Mark Kennedy is lead researcher and project director at Dana-Farber Cancer Institute. He is a graduate of Tufts University and on the faculties of Simmons and Regis College.

Margo Michaels is the Executive Director and President of ENACCT, the Education Network to Advance Cancer Clinical Trials. Over the last 15 years, she has developed numerous innovative programs to educate cancer advocates, community leaders and health care professionals about policy and science issues related to cancer and cancer clinical trials. Prior to starting ENACCT, she served as Branch Chief at NCI's Public and Survivor Education Branch, as the Lead Consultant to the Clinical Research: Affiliates Funding Trials (CRAFT) program at the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation, and as the Director of the National Breast Cancer Coalition's Project LEAD.

Linda Ng, MD, is a native of Los Angeles who completed her BA degree in Molecular and Cell Biology with Honors at the University of Berkeley in 1992. She attended Tufts University School of Medicine graduating in 1998, completing her general surgery training at the Beth-Israel Deaconess Medical Center before completing a Urology Residency at the Lahey Clinic. Dr. Ng continued her post graduate training at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor as a Fellow in Female Urology, Neurourology and Reconstructive Surgery. Dr. Ng joined the Boston University Medical School faculty in August, 2005, as an assistant professor of Urology.

Bhalchandra Parulkar, MD, MCh, is the chief of Urology at St. Vincent Hospital in Worcester, MA and has privileges at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center, St. Vincent Hospital, and Marlboro Hospital. He has numerous publications and presentations to his credit and has special interest in the field of advanced laparoscopic and robotic surgery, diseases of the prostate and kidney, urinary incontinence, male infertility, sexual dysfunction, urological stone diseases, as well as minimally invasive office procedures such as vasectomy and vasectomy reversals.

Dalton Skerritt, MHE, is well-known as a community leader who has been actively engaged in the struggle against health disparities in the urban neighborhoods of Boston and as an advocate for the communities suffering from extreme poverty. Program manager for the Edward Harris Men's Health Clinic at Whittier Street Health Center and board member for Center for Community Health Education Research and Service (CCHERS), he received the Power to End Stroke Health Disparities Leadership Award in 2009.

Andrew Wagner, MD, specializes in minimally invasive surgical approaches to urologic cancer with a focus on prostate and kidney surgery at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center. His research interests include evaluating health related quality of life following prostate and kidney surgery, and developing surgical simulation strategies and models for robotic surgery training.

Sheila Wolfson, M.Ed., LDN, CNS, is a licensed nutritionist and health counselor and educator, currently in private practice in Natick, MA. She has spent over 20 years counseling people with cancer and has offered classes at The Wellness Community and now at Facing Cancer Together. For many years, she has presented a workshop, "Nutrition and the Immune System," at Beth Israel's Celebration of Life Day.
